THE INFLUENCE ON ENVIRONMENT TOWARD HOMOSEXUALITY IN THE MOVIE MOONLIGHT (2016) BY BARRY JENKINS: AS QUEER STUDY

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ABSTRACT

This research aims at how the setting of the movie Moonlight affected the main character's choice to self-identify as gay. This study applied the qualitative approach to the data and Judith Butler's queer theory to determine the analysis. The second, performativity as a homosexual or gay are seen as in recognition, utterances, appearance, and sexual activities. The final issues the main character has as a gay in a heterosexual culture are hiding, social punishment, and disclosing.

Janah (2017) argues that the development of a person's identity is greatly influenced by their gender. Men and women are often separated using the term "gender." Gender is a term used to describe the roles that men and women play in society. It is the type of individual manipulation and the meaningless effect of impacted culture. It means gender as a separation of being masculine or feminine(Rosalita, 2020).

People become more open and inclusive of gender over time. The word used for LGBT individuals is one example (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender). In heterosexual society, LGBT people have been stigmatized and seen as deviant. Homosexuality is one among them. In some people and nations, it is still debatable. Many people do not want to talk about homosexuality, according to Oetomo (2001:43). It is because society either does not understand it well or does not understand it at all. Everyone has a different opinion about how homosexuals are handled in the modern world; some people tolerate them, while others reject them(Rudy, 2016).

This study on the influence of the environment will talk about homosexuality. It entails stating that a person's surroundings have an impact on their personality. And the topic is Barry Jenkins' film "*Moonlight*." The story centers on Chiron, who experiences frequent bullying from his friend and lacks a mother figure because his mother is a narcotic. As a result, the main focus of this study will be how the main character's environment influences his sexual orientation.

LITERATURE REVIEW

Popular Culture and Movie

including CDs, DVDs, books, and films, which closely considers what customers want and like, supports this. Ideas, traditions, and objects meant to be broadly disseminated are referred to as popular culture (Junaid & Ikhsan, 2014).

The movie is one form of popular culture that people use to appreciate literature. A movie script is usually available in movies to complete them. Both original works and those that have already been published are included. It implies that the script is a screenplay for a movie having a setting, a story, characters, and themes (Saputri, 2016).

Queer Theory by Judith Butler

It was predicated on the queer concept that, if sex is a gendered category, categorizing gender as the cultural interpretation of sex is illogical. It is not appropriate to view gender as primarily a collection of laws based on pre-defined sex (a constitutional concept). The precise production process that divides the sexes must also be considered when defining gender. It suggests that sex and gender once had a close relationship (Butler, 1990).

According to Butler's queer research viewpoint, sex, gender, and identity are all distinct from one another but nevertheless connected. Depending on one's environment and social conditions, one's definition of gender may change frequently. It implies that people's acts over time, based on their surroundings, determine their gender.

Another Butler claim is that performativity, a process, is what gives rise to gender creation. In Judith Butler's interpretation of queer theory, floating is involved. She disregards the fact that every person has a beginning and an end. Identity is created by performative movements, which evolve over time. In the heterosexuality paradigm, gender comes first and governs social behavior. Since its inception, gender has governed how people act, communicate, and love. Therefore, Butler's gender, sex, and sexual orientation are amorphous, unnatural, and change depending on the social context. Butler concurs that LGBT is not merely a societal abnormality but a performative type of human identity (Dinata, 2013).

RESEARCH METHOD

In order to analyse how the environment affected homosexuality, this study applied Judith Butler's queer theory. A descriptive qualitative methodology was used by the researcher. The researcher has conducted many actions in order to obtain the data. The first step is watching Barry Jenkins' "*Moonlight*" and becoming proficient at reading scripts. After that, discover the data and develop it so that it is precise and synchronous. The last is related to all of the information and conclusion.

FINDING AND DISCUSSION

The Influence of Environment toward the Main Character's Sexual Orientation as a Homosexual

The researcher's concentrate will be on the effects of the environments that were the subject of this analysis, such as Chiron's family environment and his school environment. It will also be revealed that a person's actions and decisions, including their level of sexual attraction, can be influenced by their environment.

The Influence of School toward the Main Character's Sexual Orientation as a Homosexual

The previous sentence reflects the character's life in the tough environment. He experienced peer pressure, which accidentally shaped his personality. His interest in homosexuality has also been inspired by what his friends have said about gay people. Accordingly, a person's gender may alter over time based on their conditions and environment.

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Bunch of kids: "Get that nigga!"

"Get Your ass here"

"Going around with that faggot ass, bro"

"Ain't gonna catch him"

"Kick his ass"

(Juan looks away from Terrence, across the road and sees...

Three young boys (adolescents, 12/13 years old) with sticks chasing LITTLE (similarly aged but smaller, a runt) who is running, terrified) (02.20 – 02.30)
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On other occasions, men are consistently portrayed as brave and strong. It implies that masculinity is something that society expects of men. Weak men frequently act intimidated and have their actions undervalued. Chiron, the main character, is scared of his classmates because of his differences and worries that bullying at school would drive him to change who he is.

Kevin: See, you just gotta show them niggas you ain't soft.

Little: I ain't soft. Always and forever a hothead this one

Kevin: I know man, I know. But... (pauses for effect) ...don't mean nothin' if they don't know (15.18-15.27)

The toxic masculinity portrayed in the movie suggests that a man must be tough and combative to be considered a real man. Chiron experienced a gender identity crisis as a result of the tough environment making him worried about the contrasts within himself. He becomes even more afraid of being bullied as a result of his classmates' mockery. Then he started to question whether he is gay.

Terrell: Get off to me, now ain't with that gay shit. But if you fuck with me, I'll give your ass more than you can handle.

Chiron: Fuck y'all niggas (Chiron tries to fight them back) Terrel: what did you say? Huh? Say it again dog, I swear

Chiron: whatever man.

Terrell: Aight, your better stay ass right there if you know what good for you. you see how tight this nigga jeans be? Nigga nuts must be chokin' in them tight ass jeans, boy I swear (47.22 - 47.53)

The Role of the Family toward the Main Character's Sexual Orientation as a Homosexual

The family has a critical influence in shaping a person's moral character. The only parent Chiron has in the family of the movie's main character is his mother. His mother Paula is a drug addict. Paula has never been a mother figure to him, and he thinks his mother is awful. Juan is more concerned than his mother since he is a stranger. Paula's presence in his life gave him the impression that women could not comprehend him. In contrast, a man shows affection and care. Chiron may have thought men understood him better than women. This suggests that he is gay or has homosexual traits.

Juan: I saw your mama last night.

Little: I hate her (32.40 – 32.47)

Paula is infuriated with Chiron because he keeps quiet when other guys try to interrupt him in the conversation between Juan and Paula. Furthermore, she thinks strangely as a result of the drug's effects. He detests going back home because of how she was treated. Chiron is not included in the portrayal of a family that ought to be a cause for criticism in the movie. Strangers, though, provide him warmth and security. That leads us to the conclusion that a person's family has a big part in their personality. Additionally, a person's activities are influenced by their environment.

The performativity of Judith Butler fits this description. A genuine identity is created by a performance, which consists of a number of movements, gestures, and emotions. Additionally, it makes the case that behaviors such as actions and words

that are influenced by an individual's environment and exhibited in themselves produce gender identity.

Performativity in the Recognition of Main Character's Gender Identity as a Homosexual

The performativity of the discourse was made clear when Chiron questioned Juan and Teresa about "is he faggot." Chiron's comments and body language regarding it demonstrate his propensity for letting his surroundings affect how he performs as well as how his activities contributed to his current state of pain. He will make the choice to discover his own misunderstanding.

Little: Am I a faggot?

Juan: No, you can be gay but you gotta let nobody call you faggot.

Little: How do I know?

Juan: You just do...I think....

Teresa: You'll know when you know

Juan: Hey, you ain't gotta know right now, all right... not yet (33.57 - 34.24)

The Performativity in Utterances of The Main Character as a Homosexuality

Chiron's portrayal demonstrates that his words about mentioning homosexuality are a performance. Chiron wonders what a "faggot" is. It is because his pals used to refer to him in that way. That conversation started when Chiron inquired as to whether he faggot. The source of Chiron's interest in homosexuality was disclosed by his unconsciously raised question about faggot. Juan, on the other hand, replies that the word "faggot" is used to dehumanize gay people in response to the query. It implies that LGBT people continue to be denied access to their natural surroundings and are viewed as repulsive or unhealthy.

Another moment, Chiron's revelation shows something about him on the inside by showing how he feels enthusiastic about Kevin. Chiron needs to accept that he is gay at this point. It has been demonstrated that Chiron exhibits homosexual traits, especially while talking about homosexuality. Chiron is portrayed as a gentle, timid man who is always terrified by people around him. In regards to women, his character has a soft side. It demonstrated how at ease Chiron is when he is close to Kevin. He looks into the sexual interactions that he and the others have. A homosexual appears to partake in a variety of sex practices. Chiron's desire reflects the optimism that results in comforting oneself. Chiron's self-aware behavior toward homosexuals is the effect of environment-influenced behavior.

Chiron has always faced prejudice because of his uniqueness and uncertainty about his gender identification. This demonstrated how those who are different in society face ongoing prejudice and rejection.

The final is the problem of homosexuality of the main character, which is organized by hiding, social punishment, and disclosing.
