On the other hand, women now have greater opportunities than they had in earlier capitalist eras. As a result of advancements in capitalism, women may now find employment. Despite the fact that it increases the labour market and gives women more opportunities, capitalism is an oppressive system. Due to their diminished influence, employers will exploit employees.

As capitalism evolves in the modern era, many feminist believe that the only way to stop injustice is to eradicate it from its foundation. Feminists think that capitalism is at the heart of the problem of women's oppression, and that it is linked to patriarchy, or male supremacy. However, while both capitalism and patriarchy place a premium on analysis, they both have the same problem to address: oppression and exploitation (Beauvoir, 1967).

The women freedom are fundamental human right that the United Nations acknowledged for all people worldwide almost 70 years ago. These liberties include the right to an education, the freedom from slavery and discrimination, the right to own property, the ability to vote, and the right to a just and equitable wage. According to the now-famous proverb, "Women's rights are human rights." Women have the same rights as men, to put it simply. Practically everywhere in the globe, women and girls continue to face discrimination based only on their gender (CEDAW, 1979).

THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

The major subjects of this study are the feminist viewpoint and Simone de Beauvoir's philosophy, which both characterize the feminism movement for women.

Feminism

Feminism is a global movement that is represented by a wide range of organizations working to advance the rights and interests of women. For the most of Western history, women were restricted to the home while males were permitted to take part in public life. In medieval Europe, women were denied the freedom to own property, pursue education, and engage in public life. At the end of the nineteenth century, they were still required to cover their heads in public in France, and in some parts of Germany, a husband could still sell his wife. Women were not allowed to conduct business without the presence of a male representative, whether it was their father, brother, spouse, legal agent, or even their kid. Without their husbands' approval, married women could not exercise control over their own children. Women also had limited or no access to education and were excluded from the majority of occupations. Women are still subjected to such limitations in several parts of the world (britannica.com).

Simone de Beauvoir's Feminism Theory

Feminism is focused with women's struggle against gender prejudice, wherein they are viewed as the second gender. One "becomes" a woman, not is born as one. The popular book "The Second Sex," which contains this thought-provoking quote by Simone de Beauvoir, contributed to the downfall of the notion that women are naturally feminine. Despite the fact that she spent the majority of her life insisting she was not a feminist because she felt the term was in opposition to her socialist principles, Beauvoir's theories had a significant effect on feminist thought (Beauvoir, 1949).

"The Second Sex," her magnum opus, explains the fundamental ideas of feminist existentialism. Beauvoir's fundamental premise is that women only exist in society as men's "Other."

Beauvoir contends that males will never be able to completely subjugate women since every person — regardless of sex — contains a tremendous freedom. Instead, she thinks that despite being objectified and devalued in society, everyone, especially women, has the right to make their own decisions.

Beauvoir is nevertheless acknowledged as a key figure in the feminist movement despite these accusations. She identified herself a feminist in 1972 and spent the most of the 1970s working with the French Women's Liberation Movement. Women were inspired by Beauvoir's action and thoughts both then and now.

METHODOLOGY

The researcher of this paper evaluates the movie using a feminist approach. Women's rights and gender equality are the main objectives of this approach. A woman must accept her identity as a woman with gender equality, equal rights, and the capacity to realize her potential, according to Simone de Beauvoir.

RESULT AND DISCUSSION

The Personality of Female Characters

a. Imperator Furiosa

A woman imperator who subsequently rises to the position of warlord for Immortan Joe. Furiosa is her given name. The entire movie's narrative makes it clear that Immortan Joe also oppresses or possibly exploits Imperator Furiosa. Furiosa is more manly in temperament and has more guts and strength than Joe's five wives. She is the only female to rise to the position of warlord for Immortan Joe since she is a skilled combatant. Listed below is a citation that supports this:

MAX : *No* ... *You*.

He selects a girl wearing goggles ... she's been cleaning the air filters ... seems CAPABLE. The Praetorian hands her the bolt-cutters. She approaches MAX.

CAPABLE: It's got a gun.

MAX : Cut it.

He chances a look back ... Mistake!

CAPABLE thwacks him in the side of the head with the Bolt-Cutters.

BOOF! ... FURIOSA comes from out of nowhere.

And crash tackles him to the ground!

Fool! Underestimated them!

Before he knows it she has the GUN on his chest...

Furiosa, the solitary female warlord for Immortan Joe, is mentioned frequently in the film. Furiosa has short hair and is physically imperfect in the illustration and phrase above since her left hand has been amputated. Furiosa's disability does not, however, limit what she may achieve, including acting as a warlord. She nevertheless possesses the fighting prowess usually only possessed by males.

b. The Milking Mothers

In Mad Max: Fury Road, all of Immortan Joe's wives and Furiosa's five spouses experience persecution and exploitation. Another illustration of this is Immortan Joe, who symbolizes how the capitalist patriarchy oppresses and exploits The Milking Mothers. The Milking Mothers are the women Immortan Joe keeps around to create milk. They are shown as overweight women with jutting breasts and belly. A pipe pumps up their breasts to produce milk. The following statement describes this situation:

It is clear that the milking moms in the aforementioned quotation are producing milk. They are just kept around by Immortan Joe so they can produce milk. Citadel at that time needed milk badly, and as water is a limited supply, the Milking Mothers are producing milk to satisfy that demand. Its rarity increases its worth as a possession.

c. The Five Wives

Immortan Joe, the antagonist character, is portrayed as a brutal commander in Mad Max: Fury Road. He is in charge of Citadel and has complete control over the water and oil supplies that are crucial to the plot at that point. Despite the fact that Immortan Joe is a ruler and has a wife of his own, there is still a patriarchal system in place. Currently, he is married to five women. Cheedo the Fragile, The Dag, Capable, Toast the Knowing, The Splendid Angharad are the five wives of Immortan Joe. Of the five wives, Cheedo the Fragile is the first. The word "fragile" is highly allusive. According to her moniker, she is an extremely frail woman. She wants to go back to Immortan Joe since she feels helpless after the killing of the Angharad, but Capable and The Dag stop her. The following conversation exemplifies her performance:

Capable: Stop!

Cheedo: He'll pardon us. I am confident that he will.

Capable: There is no turning back!

Cheedo: We were his priceless possessions!

Capable : Cheedo!

Cheedo: We were guarded! He showed us the good life!

What's wrong with that, exactly? The Dag: We are not objects.

Cheedo: Not at all! (01:00:31 – 01:00:49)

The Dag is the second of the five wives. The representation of The Dag in the movie, according to the researcher, is clearly identical. She has an unusual personality and an untidy appearance. Immortan Joe also wants to exploit him and other women while suppressing her views. This can be found in the following conversation:

Cheedo: We were his priceless possessions!

Capable: Cheedo!

Cheedo: We were guarded! He showed us the good life!

What's wrong with that, exactly? The Dag: We are not objects. (01:00:38 – 01:00:55)

The third of the five wives is Capable. She also takes up Angharad's position as the brave one once Angharad is dead. She has the courage to take a seat in the back when it is required to keep the War Rig in balance after Angharad's death, after it has been somewhat damaged by hitting a rock. The conversation that follows is a description of her:

Furiosa: We require stock. Each gun's ammunition should be matched. I'm going to do some fixes now.

Max: someone is required down the rear.

Capable: I'll go.

Furiosa: No. Please continue to be together.

Capable: I can manage it. (01:01:36 – 01:01:51)

The fourth of the five wives is Toast the Knowing. The writer claims that the name "toast" refers to a dish connected with ladies. The researcher also thinks that the name "Knowing" relates to knowledge, intellect, or anything smart. It shows Toast as she is portrayed. This is seen in the conversation below:

Max: No. We should go back the way we came, in my opinion. across the canyon.

Toast: We all know it's open, right? He entered with all of his battle parties.

Max: In order to go through them, we take the War Rig and charge it. The tanker may be disconnected from us at

the pass so we can turn it off behind us.

Seeds: Kaboom!

Furiosa: And if we're still alive at that point, how precisely do we capture the Citadel?

Toast: It will be simple if we can stop the pass. His War Pups and War Boys who are too ill to battle are the only ones remaining.

The fifth of the five wives, The Splendid Angharad, is a stunning lady. She is one of Immortan Joe's five wives and was carrying a kid at the time of the escape. The researcher argues that she is a lovely lady, inferring from her name that she may help others. She is intelligent and has a pretty face. According to the quotation that follows, his fifth wife:

FURIOSA lines up another shot on the Warlord. SPLENDID offers herself as a shield once more. THE IMMORTAN Hold fire!
But his brother RICTUS has already lined up his HARPOON on MAX It misses ...
And THUDS into the dash. (Page 118)

The Women Are Able To Achieve Freedom

a. Furiosa and The Five Wives flee by utilizing the War Rig

The five wives of Immortan Joe, including Furiosa, are attempting to escape by using the War Rig to get to Green Place. Furiosa made multiple efforts to escape Immortan Joe, but now that she is in charge of the War Rig, she stands the best chance of succeeding. It is also the point at which Immortan Joe's five wives may finally use their ability to escape. It may consequently be inferred that the five wives' power came from the one chance Furiosa had to drive War Rig and escape. The following quotation reveals this:

The characterisation analysis shows that the five wives display feminist characteristics once they have obtained power. Furiosa and the five wives are well aware of the savagery of Immortan Joe. He's cruel to all the people that live in the Citadel, not just them.

b. Furiosa killing Immortan Joe

The Immortan troops welcomes MAX, FURIOSA, AND THE FIVE WIVES by raising their car through the elevator.

The Milking Mothers share Aqua Cola water and are liberated from Immortan tyranny. (01:49:50-01:52:25)

According to the quotation above, The Milking Mothers are also free from Immortan Joe's oppression, in addition to Furiosa and The Five Wives. The Milking Mothers are liberated from Immortan Joe and now share Aqua Cola's water because he no longer has sole ownership of the beverage firm. It is concluded that the communist society is effective in achieving equality among its members, between the women who surround Immortan Joe and the other citizens of Citadel.

CONCLUSION

The researcher assesses the qualities of the female characters that Immortan Joe, the male tyrant in the movie, is surrounded by. They are Imperator Furiosa, The Milking Mothers, and The Five Wives. Imperator Furiosa is first. Given that Furiosa has endurance that is virtually equal to a man's, it is obvious that she is a macho woman. Despite being a woman, she is courageous, independent, and manly, according to Furiosa's perspective of view. The Milking Mothers is second. Immortan Joe exploits the lactating moms in order to profit from their ability to produce milk. Since Immortan Joe uses them as milk production slaves, they are likewise given harsh treatment. The Five Wives is third. Each of Immortan Joe's brides has an adjective that accurately describes them. The first wife is Cheedo the Fragile. Although she behaves in an odd manner throughout the film and has an odd name to match, Immortan Joe is the one person she genuinely wants to leave behind. The third wife is Capable. She is a brave woman who can take action when required. The fourth wife is Toast the Knowing. She must have good thoughts because she offers a plan of attack against Immortan Joe's group. The fifth wife is the Splendid Angharad. She employs a deft maneuver to stay clear of Immortan Joe throughout the entire movie.
